The altar flowers are given today to the glory of God
 by Cheryl and Allen Patton

The communion texts used in today's service are adapted from sources that date back to 1549. This historical continuity reminds us of our connection to those who have celebrated this holy meal before us. In eloquent and poetic language, these texts also remind us of our personal relationship with God. Before we come to the table, we are reminded of our need for God's mercy. God's forgiveness enables us to come to the table. United in this forgiveness, we come to the table as a forgiven and reconciled community in love and charity with each other.

Hymnic Notes: The processional hymn of praise contrasts strong and powerful biblical metaphors for God who reigns above, God of all creation, God of power, with personal pietistic descriptions, God an 'ever present help and stay,' and 'As with a mother's tender hand, God gently leads the chosen band.' The melody has a long association with the Bohemian Brethren. The hymns and hymn singing of their 18th century German/British counterpart, Moravians, greatly influenced John and Charles Wesley.


The recessional hymn poses a series of questions with a single answer, reflecting the all-sufficiency of Christ Jesus, the crucified Savior. The form resembles an interlocutor being addressed: 'are you asking me what great thing I know? Well, I'll tell you.' The tune HENDON, named after a village near London it is believed the composer H. A. César Malan visited, is the surviving melody of the 19th century French Evangelical Protestant revivals. (*Written by Carlton Young*)

Preaching: Michael Williams
Who Will Deliver Me?
Romans 7:14-25

For we know that the law is spiritual; but I am of the flesh, sold into slavery under sin. I do not understand my own actions. For I do not do what I want, but I do the very thing I hate. Now if I do what I do not want, I agree that the law is good. But in fact it is no longer I that do it, but sin that dwells within me. For I know that nothing good dwells within me, that is, in my flesh. I can will what is right, but I cannot do it. For I do not do the good I want, but the evil I do not want is what I do. Now if I do what I do not want, it is no longer I that do it, but sin that dwells within me. So I find it to be a law that when I want to do what is good, evil lies close at hand. For I delight in the law of God in my inmost self, but I see in my members another law at war with the law of my mind, making me captive to the law of sin that dwells in my members. Wretched man that I am! Who will rescue me from this body of death? Thanks be to God through Jesus Christ our Lord! So then, with my mind I am a slave to the law of God, but with my flesh I am a slave to the law of sin.
