Communion by Intinction

With intinction, congregants will approach Rev. Shannon Baxter and Dr. Tammy Lewis Wilborn from the center aisle to receive the bread with palms out; then, one should take the bread and dip it lightly into the juice.

After eating the bread, congregants are invited to spend time at the altar where you may be anointed by Rev. Carol Cavin-Dillon or Rev. Will McLeane with frankincense, if one wishes, and/or visit one of the two prayer candle stations.

Congregants are welcome to light candles in memory of a loved one or as a sign of their prayer to God for the season.

Prayer Shawls

Receiving a prayer shawl is like being wrapped in an embrace of love and compassion. It carries with it the warmth of heartfelt prayers and intentions woven into each stitch. It's more than just a garment; it's a symbol of a community's collective prayers and an expression of support. West End United Methodist Church has had a Prayer Shawl ministry for many years.
