

Today's Music

Isaac Watts wrote "I Sing the Almighty Power of God" in eight four-line stanzas for his *Divine Songs Attempted in Easy Language, for the Use of Children*, published in 1715. It was the second song in the collection, under the title "Praise for Creation and Providence." In his preface, Watts wrote, "the Children of high and low degree, of the Church of England, or Dissenters, baptized in infancy, or not, may all join together in these Songs. And as I have endeavored to sink the language to the level of a Child's understanding and wat to keep it (if possible) shows contempts so I have designed to understanding, and yet to keep it (if possible) above contempt: so I have designed to profit all (if possible) and offend none."

It is in the radically different character of the two days that we discover the meaning of each. If you attend the Jazz Mass, seriously consider attending one of the Ash Wednesday services as well. If you are a regular attender at an Ash Wednesday service, seriously consider participating in the Jazz Mass in preparation to experience the importance of the imposition of ashes that follows the next day.

Not only is this training interactive, but it is also steeped in evidence-based practices like Trauma-Informed Care and operates in an anti-oppression framework.
